

ESP Conference Keynote Speakers



Steve Cook MEA President

Steve Cook became the first education support professional ever to be elected MEA president in 2011, and he'll retire this August having achieved another distinction: longest-serving officer among all the state NEA affiliates in the country.

Cook first assumed statewide office in 1991 with his election as secretary-treasurer, a position he served in for 15 years. During that time, he worked to translate a previously hard-to-understand budget into "plain English," so directors could make better-informed decisions. He was elected vice president in 2006, where he served for five years until taking over the top post.

"Becoming the first support staff member to be president of this union has been a huge honor," he says. "It's also a strong symbol that all of us in public education stand together as union brothers and sisters."

His legacy will include a titanic shift in relations between MEA and AFT Michigan. Under his leadership, the state's two largest education unions transformed from adversaries to partners-combining the power of 185,000 preK-16 education employees from all corners of the state. "That's only going to help us going forward," he says. "Working together, we can improve learning conditions for students by helping ensure our schools get the resources they need and our education employees are treated as valued professionals."

President of the Lansing Educational Assistants from 1981 to 1993, Cook was a paraprofessional for 15 years in the Lansing Public Schools, working as a community school coordinator, home/school liaison in the elementary attendance project and in alternative education. He holds a bachelor's degree from Michigan State University with emphasis in history, economics and political science.



Maury Koffman NEA Executive Committee

Maury Koffman, an educator, leader, and second-generation union activist from East Lansing, Michigan, was elected to the National Education Association (NEA) Executive Committee in July 2013. Maury is serving his sixth term as president of the


2,400-member Michigan State University Administrative Professional Association, the largest local affiliate in the Michigan Education Association. Maury's mother was also an ESP union president of a local MEA affiliate in Blanchard, Michigan.

Maury is in his seventh year as a member of the NEA Board of Directors. During his tenure, he has served as a member of the NEA Board Steering Committee, the State Media Advisory Committee, and an elected delegate to the NEA Representative Assembly. He earned a bachelor's degree and a law degree from Michigan State University and is a graduate of the NEA Emerging Leader Academy.

Maury has served an essential role organizing new bargaining units throughout the country and has displayed a strong and effective passion in recruiting, engaging, and retaining member involvement, particularly among younger and newer educators.



From The North -- St. Johns and Upper Peninsula

Follow US-27 South towards Lansing to I-69 west (Exit #89) continue on I-69 west. Continue to head towards Charlotte/Ft Wayne, I-69 West merges with I-96 east. Go to I-496 (Downtown Lansing Exit #95). Go one mile on I-496 to Creyts Road (exit #1). Turn left on Creyts Road; turn right at first light (Anacapri Blvd.) The Crowne Plaza is the second drive on the right.

From The South -- Jackson Area

Follow US-127 North towards Lansing to I-96 west (towards Gr. Rapids); continue on I-96 to I-496 east (downtown Lansing exit #95). Take Creyts road (Exit #1). Turn left on Creyts Road. Turn right at the first light (Anacapri Blvd.). The Crowne Plaza is the second drive on the right.

From the South -- Battle Creek Area

Follow I-69 north towards Lansing. I-69 will merge with I-96 west. Continue to I-496 east (Downtown Lansing Exit #95) Take Creyts Road (exit #1) and turn left on Creyts Road. Turn right at the first light (Anacapri Blvd.). The Crowne Plaza is the second drive on the right.

From the East --Detroit Area

Take I-96 west towards Lansing to I-496 west (Exit # 106B). Continue on I-496 to Creyts Road North (Exit 1B). Take this exit and turn right on Creyts Road. Take a right at the first light (Anacapri Blvd.). The Crowne Plaza is the second drive on the right.

From the West -- Grand Rapids

PROCEDURES FOR RECEIVING MECPL CREDIT

If you would like to receive MECPL credit for attending approved sessions at the 2017 MEA ESP Statewide Conference, here are a few things you will need to do.






