101 INCORPORATING MINDFULNESS

There are news stories almost daily that discuss the negative toll stress takes on us. Our jobs are stressful. We have had our lives disrupted by a pandemic. Inflation may be causing financial concerns. Our students are not exempt from stress and are often less able to handle their emotions. Practicing mindfulness has been shown to improve physical and mental health. In this session, participants will engage in a brief mindfulness exercise and learn some techniques that can be implemented in the classroom to support the overall wellbeing of themselves and their students.
